

National Tribal Air Association's Fact Sheet on <u>EPA's Proposed Repeal of the Clean Power Plan</u>

What Is This Proposed Repeal?

The Clean Power Plan established emission guidelines for states to follow in limiting carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions from existing electric generating units (EGUs) approximately 30% below 2005 levels by 2030. Under the Clean Air Act (CAA) and supported by the Supreme Court's Endangerment Finding, CO₂ is considered to be a pollutant and therefore must be regulated by the EPA.

The CPP was originally proposed in June 2014 in order to comply with the law for regulating CO₂. It went through the legal process of hearings and comment periods, culminating in a final rule in October 2015. Early lawsuits opposing the CPP were rejected by the courts. The EPA is now proposing to repeal the CPP and rescind the accompanying legal memorandum. This repeal is based on the claim that the CPP regulates emissions "outside the fenceline" and that that goes beyond the legal reach of the CAA. While NTAA does not endorse the views of the Union of Concerned Scientists, this blog post includes a fair review of the legal justification for this repeal.

How Does It Affect My Tribe?

The <u>NTAA published a White Paper</u> in December, 2015, outlining the benefits of the CPP to Tribes. Rescinding this rule will undermine any forward momentum achieved in reducing CO₂ emissions from existing EGUs and will allow existing EGUs to continue emitting CO₂ at their current levels. Continued emissions of CO₂ will perpetuate the effects of climate change already being suffered by American Indians and Alaska Natives. Because AI/AN are disproportionately affected by environmental degradation and climate change, and have a lesser degree of control over emissions from EGUs, the health of these communities and their lands will continue to be negatively impacted.

Where Can I Find More Information?

EPA will hold a public hearing November 28 -29, 2017, in Charleston, W.Va, on the <u>proposed</u> repeal of the <u>Clean Power Plan</u>. The Agency is accepting requests to speak at the public hearing, and registration will close on November 16, 2017. <u>Request to Speak at the Public Hearing</u>
