EPA To Host Brownfields Stakeholder Session to Hear from Nonprofit Organizations and Community Foundations Across the Country on Their Work at Sites in Underserved Communities

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced it will host an online discussion on April 23, with nonprofits and community foundations across the country to learn about nonprofit leadership in brownfields assessment, cleanup, and redevelopment projects. The goal of this discussion is to provide EPA with a better understanding of how to support nonprofit efforts to assess, cleanup and redevelop brownfields sites in the communities they serve.

The Biden-Harris Administration is committed to advancing economic opportunities and addressing environmental justice issues in underserved communities. During this discussion, EPA wants to hear and learn from representatives from various types of nonprofits who encounter – or could encounter – brownfields within their communities, especially those nonprofits who work to address the disproportionate health, environmental, economic, and climate impacts on disadvantaged communities. EPA Environmental Justice and Systemic Racism Speaker Series: Redlining and the Climate Crisis

This session of EPA's Environmental Justice (EJ) and Systemic Racism Speaker Series will focus on redlining and the climate crisis. Understanding structural racism and the climate crisis is key to shaping urban governance and the future of America's cities. The co-authors of a recent study on the correlation of redlined areas and the location of urban heat islands will discuss their participatory research on the spatial distribution of climate impacts, involving communities in measuring heat in cities. Their interdisciplinary approach offers a compelling perspective on how scientists and residents seek to address disproportionate vulnerability emerging from climate change.

In August 2019, EPA and other federal and state agencies released the update to the Wildfire Guide for Public Health Officials, along with additional information for protecting children from exposure to wildfire smoke. Following the release, EPA's Office of Children's Health Protection and Office of Air and Radiation have set up a multi-stakeholder effort, with tribal, federal, state, and local officials, the

Pediatric Environmental Health Specialty Units, health care professional organizations, non-governmental organizations, academics, and industry experts to work collaboratively to address additional children's health issues in more detail. This workshop is intended for public health, air quality, and emergency planning and response officials. COMING SOON! 2021 DERA Tribal and Insular Area Request for Applications

EPA's 2021 Tribal and Insular Area grant program is planned to open in late April 2021. EPA anticipates awarding approximately \$5 million in DERA funding under this announcement. A total of \$4.5 million will be made available to tribal governments (or intertribal consortia) and Alaska Native villages, and \$500,000 will be made available to insular area governments. EPA anticipates awarding five to ten cooperative agreements to tribal governments (or intertribal consortia) and Alaska Native villages and two to four cooperative agreements to insular area governments. This year's Request for Applications (RFA) has no mandatory cost share requirement and sets funding limits to \$800,000 for tribal applicants and \$250,000 for insular area applicants. Each applicant may submit up to two applications.

NEW! EPA Opens Comment Period on Draft Biological Opinion on Malathion.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is seeking public comment on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (FWS) draft biological opinion for the registration of malathion, an insecticide that is commonly used to control mosquitoes and a variety of insects that attack fruits, vegetables, landscaping plants, and shrubs. The draft biological opinion evaluates whether use of malathion is likely to jeopardize federally threatened and endangered species or destroy or adversely modify their critical habitats. In January 2017, EPA released the biological evaluation for malathion, which found potential effects on threatened and endangered species and their designated critical habitats. Because the biological evaluation for malathion made "likely to adversely affect" determinations to some threatened and endangered species and their designated critical habitats, EPA has been consulting with FWS to ensure the registration of malathion is not likely to jeopardize the continued existence of these species or adversely modify their critical habitats. The public comment period will be open for 60 days and will close on June 19, 2021. The draft biological opinion is included in docket EPA-HQ-OPP-2021-0231 at www.regulations.gov.

Webinar: Safe Transportation of Lithium Batteries: What You Need to Know in 2021

April 29; 1:30 – 4:30pm ET / Register Here

Lithium batteries are key to our modern connected world, from our cellphones and computers to our cars - and not just electric cars! Lithium batteries also have an increasing role in storing electricity for the electric grid which is critical to society and future progress. However, used lithium batteries aren't like the used alkaline or lead acid batteries that many of us are familiar with handling. Because of the battery's high energy density and the potential for serious incident, special preparation is needed when shipping these batteries. This webinar will provide the audience with new and updated information, as well as discussion on electric vehicle and electric storage lithium batteries, damaged, defective, and recalled (DDR) lithium batteries, and DOT special permit packaging. Participants will learn how to prevent, reduce, or eliminate risks of fire or explosions caused by the improper packaging, marking, labeling, or disposal of lithium batteries. Join us for a webinar hosted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and led by subject matter experts from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration.

Please join EPA's Office of Transportation and Air Quality for a webinar describing how MOVES3 differs from MOVES2014b, the previous model version. MOVES3, a state-of-the-science upgrade to EPA's modeling tools, is EPA's latest model for estimating air pollution emissions from cars, trucks, motorcycles, and buses, as well as many categories of nonroad equipment. This webinar is designed for people who have experience with the MOVES model and is not intended as a training for new users. However, anyone who is interested in MOVES is welcomed to attend.

Webinar: Abandoned Vehicles on Tribal Lands: Background, Management Approaches, and Case Studies

May 11 & May 18, 9am – 11am PT / Register Here

Abandoned vehicles pose an environmental and human health threat to tribal lands. The presence of such vehicles can encourage additional dumping and may attract unsafe or illegal activities. This training features real-world tribal approaches to tracking vehicle abandonment, scrapping and recycling vehicles, and using outreach and compliance strategies to minimize vehicle accumulation. Tuesday 5/11 (Part One): Explores vehicle abandonment and uncontrolled accumulation, and discusses approaches to identifying and tracking potential vehicle concerns. Covers current markets for recycled metals and the impact on auto scrapping. Includes approaches used by Region 9 tribes for safely collecting, crushing and removing cars on tribal lands. Tuesday 5/18 (Part Two): Covers examples of codes and ordinances that govern and support abandoned vehicle abatement. Includes case studies from Region 9 tribes that have worked with their communities to reduce vehicle accumulation and discourage use of vehicles for illegal encampments. Reviews examples of large-scale vehicle cleanups and identifies options for federal and state assistance.

First Nations Development Institute grant opportunity

With the generous support of the Indigenous Peoples Fund at Tides Foundation, First Nations will establish a Gather Food Sovereignty Grant that will support work contributing to building a national movement that will fulfill a vision of Native communities and food systems that are self-directed, well-resourced and supported by community policies and systems. This opportunity is targeting emerging projects that focus on developing Tribal Food Sovereignty. Through the first round of the Gather Food Sovereignty Grant, First Nations expects to award up to 13 grant awards of approximately \$32,000 to support Native American-led food sovereignty work. *The grant period for this funding opportunity will commence March 1, 2021, and end February 28, 2022.* Application on the Gather Food Sovereignty Grant site.

Assistant Secretary Sweeney Announces \$3 Million Living Languages Grant Program Funding Opportunity

Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs Tara Mac Lean Sweeney announced today that the Office of Indian Energy and Economic Development (IEED) is soliciting applications to the Living Languages Grant Program (LLGP). This \$3 Million grant program will fund between 15 and 60 grants, ranging from \$25,000-\$200,000, to federally recognized American Indian tribes and Alaska Native entities to document, preserve and revitalize Native languages and build active speaker capacity. IEED's solicitation for LLGP funding and details on how to apply can be found in the Federal Register and at Grants.Gov.

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) posted a competitive funding opportunity to assist local communities in developing sustainable capabilities to prevent targeted violence and terrorism. The FY21 Targeted Violence and Terrorism Prevention (TVTP) Grant Program seeks to provide funding to implement local prevention frameworks and explore innovative approaches to preventing targeted violence and terrorism. The FY21 program establishes the following priorities:

- Preventing Domestic Violent Extremism
- Enhancing Local Threat Assessment and Management Capabilities
- Implementing Innovative Solutions for Preventing Targeted Violence and Terrorism
- Challenging Online Violence Mobilization Narratives

The TVTP Grant Program seeks to provide funding to applications that align with these objectives and that protect privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties. Eligibility includes Tribal, state, local, territorial governments; non-profits; and institutions of higher education are eligible to apply for funds to establish capabilities or fill gaps in their prevention capabilities.

The application period opened on March 24, 2021 and will close on May 25, 2021 at 5:00:00 PM ET. Applicants should consult the NOFO for more specific information about the process. Applying for this grant is a multi-step process and it is recommended that applicants begin that process early to allow sufficient time to complete the interim steps. Applicants can register early with the Non-Disaster Grants Management System (ND Grants) and are encouraged to begin their ND Grants registration at the time of this announcement. Early registration will allow applicants to have adequate time to start and complete their application.
