The mission of the NTAA is to advance air quality management policies and programs, consistent with the needs, interests, and unique legal status of American Indian Tribes and Alaska Natives.

What is NTAA?



- NTAA is funded through a grant from the EPA Office of Air and Radiation (OAR).
- Largest membership-based national associations that partners with 153 Federally Recognized Tribes
- Governed by an Executive Committee that includes two representatives from each EPA region and Alaska.

Who is NTAA?

- NTAA is governed by the EC and supported by 3 staff members from the Institute for Tribal Environmental Professionals (ITEP)
- NTAA Executive Committee
- NTAA's Policy Advisory Committee enhances and strengthens NTAA's air quality policy support by crafting air policy and climate change policy recommendations for Tribal governments and providing policy advice to the NTAA EC

NTAA Initial Impressions

- Tribal communities are harmed by climate change, VOCs/ozone, and hazardous air pollutants from oil and natural gas sources.
- It's important that EPA finalize strong controls for new and *existing* sources as soon as possible.

NTAA Initial Impressions

- Under this proposal, most existing sources in Indian Country will remain unregulated.
 - Consider co-proposing a federal plan for Indian Country.
- EPA has not performed an assessment of Tribal impacts; conducted baseline environmental justice analysis instead.
 - EJ concerns may apply to Tribal communities but is not sufficient.
- EPA should provide additional resources for Tribes to take on programs.
